Yard Sprucing Tips

The heavy snow from this winter has taken a toll!

Grab your yard gloves and pruners to spruce up your front landscape beds. During the Community Clean-Up Day, Palmer Property Maintenance will be on-site to offer helpful tips on yard clean-up and to demonstrate proper pruning techniques. A truck will be available to haul away *yard waste* only. Palmer will also have a limited amount of mulch for residents to use in their yards. Mulch availability is on a first-come, first served basis.

Out and About ~ Random Tips for Your Use and Consideration

As we welcome warmer weather, we anticipate bright flowers, green grass, and full foliage. Some of us – perhaps even many of us – look forward to priming our green thumbs and powering-up the mowers, trimmers, clippers, etc. Yard maintenance is one of the most effective ways to keep our neighborhood looking beautiful. At the request of many homeowners, we've streamlined the administration of our landscaping covenants. We have also reduced the time for a homeowner to remedy any unapproved or non-standard landscaping prior to assessing a fine. Your Board would prefer to avoid fines and appreciates every homeowners' efforts to maintain curb appeal in The Grove.

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Warmer weather also makes our streets and sidewalks a hub of activity with walkers, runners, dog walkers and children playing. Please consider this one more plea for drivers to follow the speed limit! Last year's homeowner survey showed speeding in The Grove to be a primary concern. Additional homeowner input during the monthly HOA meetings indicates speeding as an on-going issue. For the safety of all our neighbors, please slow down when driving on the streets in The Grove.

Properly maintained front yard lights are another helpful tool to improve safety in The Grove. As a reminder and effective April 2, a new resolution requires homeowners to ensure front yard post-lights operated by a photocell are in good working order. This resolution provides aesthetic

value, while improving safety and security for the neighborhood. If your lamp is not working, first try to reset the GFI circuit breaker (generally in the garage). Next, try replacing the light bulb. (The outdoor energy-efficient compact fluorescent bulbs are long-lasting.) If the light continues to fail, you may have to replace the photocell. These can be purchased at Lowe's and Home Depot. You may want to consider having an electrician replace the photocell for you.



And for the health of our neighbors, please pick up after your pets when they relieve themselves. The Covenants Committee may cite residents who do not comply and may ultimately report the situation to Fairfax County as this is a violation of county regulations.

Splish, Splash—The Pool is Opening

Summer is fast approaching and once again it is time to prepare for the opening of our pool. By now, you should have received information in the mail on our pool rules and procedures for summer 2010. Some of the highlights are including:

- ✓ Pool season: May 28, 2010 to September 13, 2010
- ✓ Hours of operations:
- ✓ Monday-Friday, Sunday, and Holidays:
10:00am-8:00pm
- ✓ Saturdays: 10:00am-10:00pm
- ✓ What's New! - Vending machines will be installed with light snacks and drinks.

As we prepare for the season, keep in mind the following few tips that can help keep you, your children and your neighbors safe:

- ✓ Floating toys are not lifejackets or approved flotation devices and should not be used as such.
- ✓ Never leave a child unsupervised near a pool; and, do not use flotation devices as a substitute for supervision.
- ✓ Practice touch supervision with children younger than 5 years old; this means that the adult is within an arm's length of the child at all times.
- ✓ If there is any type of rain or inclement weather forecasted, do not swim or be near a pool.
- ✓ Never have glass near a pool, if it breaks it can cause damage to a pool and injure those walking barefoot.
- ✓ Remember to keep toys away from the pool area - young children playing with the toys could accidentally fall in the water.
- ✓ Never let your guard down.

Pool Passes

The 2010 stickers are pink as are the guest passes. The 2010 sticker should be placed over where the prior year is printed. Replacement passes are \$5.00 each and additional Guest passes are \$10 each. Checks for payment must be received with the request. We will not issue replacement or additional passes without the payment first.

Residents should allow two weeks for processing from the date the application and/or payment is received in our office.

Owners must be in good standing to receive their passes.

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Windy Days and Trash

~ March Winds. April Showers May Flowers

Managing those March winds can be challenging – especially on trash day. It is amazing how trash days are windier than other days. Some residents have raised concerns about having to pick up light trash that has been blown out of the recycling bins. We contacted American Disposal for tips on how to keep trash in the bins.

They provided the following suggestions:

- ✓ Residents can place all the cans, bottles and glass at the bottom of the bin and placing newspaper or cardboard on top with a brick or rock on top to weigh it down. *[They ask that bungee cords not be used as it slows down the team picking up the trash.]*
- ✓ Residents can use paper bags or clear plastic bags to secure the recycling inside the recycling bin. Only clear plastic bags can be used – do not use dark plastic bags.
- ✓ Residents may order the 64-gallon recycle carts with lids which also helps keep items from blowing loose in the community.
